This commitment was reflected in the scale of our consolidated social investment as a Group. **In 2025, we allocated COP 68,798 million to social projects across our territories. This includes COP 42,060 million managed by our Foundation and an additional COP 17,350 million contributed by Grupo Aval to the strategic project Misión La Guajira.** More than 106,000 people benefited from initiatives that are now generating real opportunities and tangible transformations.

Acting in accordance with our values –integrity, excellence, and a strong sense of social responsibility– means recognizing that business development and territorial development go hand in hand. When the Company, the Foundation, and communities act in alignment, **transformation ceases to be an aspiration and becomes a path that is sustainable over time.**

As Promigas continues to grow and prepare for new horizons, we evolve as well. We have strengthened our ability to anticipate challenges, respond with agility, and leverage digital tools to expand our impact. Every project we developed in 2025 was grounded in a shared conviction: **communities are the living energy that drives our future.**

This year's experience has shown that integrating our social strategy with our corporate vision multiplies impact, amplifies innovation, and enables us to act consistently in the face of present and future challenges.

To our partners, thank you for being part of this journey, where sustainability is put into action rather than remaining an abstract concept. And to the communities that place their trust in us, thank you for showing us that change is most powerful when it is built together.

When Communities Move Forward, We All Move Forward

2025 was a year of consolidation, but also of challenges. In an increasingly demanding social and territorial environment, we reaffirmed that our purpose is to remain close, to listen, and to act with consistency. With 25 years of working alongside communities, we have confirmed that our social footprint is not measured solely by reach, but by the depth of our engagement and our ability to drive sustainable transformations over time.

We reached rural communities, districts, and municipalities where our presence represents trust, coordination, and real opportunities. In territories where structural gaps such as youth unemployment, low rural productivity, and energy poverty persist, we chose to act with a strategic focus, strengthening capabilities, fostering local economies, and building solutions together with the people.

In 2025, we directly benefited 54,754 people across different regions of the country. This figure does not represent mass coverage, but rather intentional presence and structured engagement processes in communities where development requires sustained commitment.

Of this total number of beneficiaries, **18,362 participated in High-Impact Social Investment and Community Development initiatives; 25,000 took part in Misión La Guajira, the organization's priority strategy; and 11,392 were supported through Responsible Citizenship initiatives.** Each of these figures represents real stories of progress, trust, and opportunities built from within the territories.

The Foundation directly managed a **strategic social investment of COP 59,410 million, aimed at strengthening youth employment, entrepreneurship, productive development, energy solutions, and community strengthening.** More than 1,930 young people enhanced their skills to access the labor market; 2,940 entrepreneurs received support to grow their businesses; 1,800 productive units advanced in their consolidation; and more than 3,900 people participated in initiatives that promote more resilient and environmentally responsible territories. Each of these processes contributes to reducing social and energy gaps, energizing local economies, and strengthening trust in the territories where we operate.

This year required us to be more rigorous and strategic in our management. We learned to prioritize, concentrate our efforts on higher-impact models, and strengthen our partnerships to expand our reach without compromising quality. **We came to understand that growth does not always mean doing more, but doing better,** with greater depth and territorial coherence, acting with integrity, excellence, and social responsibility: the values that guide every decision we make.

None of this would be possible without ongoing coordination with Promigas and its companies. This alignment allows us to integrate social investment with territorial dynamics, strengthen our social license to operate, and build long-term relationships based on trust and shared responsibility. When our work is placed at the service of development, it translates into well-being, productivity, and shared prosperity.

To our partners, colleagues, and field teams, thank you for your commitment and professionalism. Your rigorous and close engagement is what makes it possible for each project to go beyond paper and become real transformation. And to every individual who participated in our programs, thank you for allowing us to walk alongside you. **You remind us that the strength to move forward is born in the territories and that true development is built by placing people at the center.**

I invite you to explore this Management Report as a reflection of a Foundation that stays close, learns, and evolves with consistency and purpose. Because when communities move forward, we all move forward.

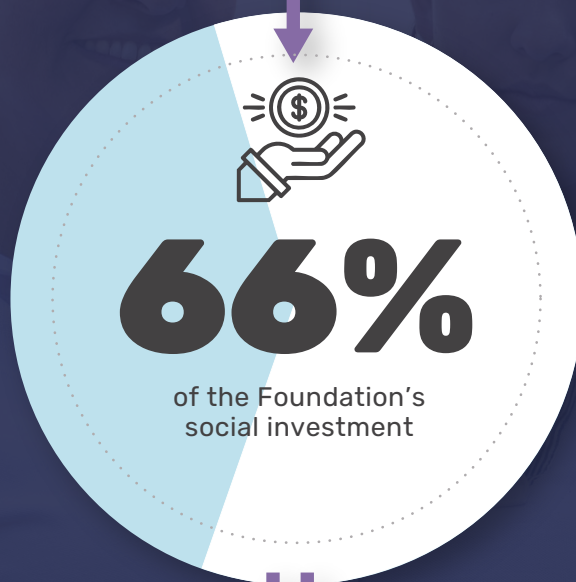

Jaider's Journey: From a Bicycle to a Dream Fulfilled

My routine was always the same: I would wake up very early, have breakfast, shower, fix up my bike, make sure everything was in order, put on some cologne, and head off to work. It was a job marked by the harshness of carrying bricks and laying them with concrete, for a wage below the minimum, and one I held onto for a single reason: my son Noah.

"I am an example. I am a completely different person from who I was before I started the course."

I also worked in the community garden in my neighborhood and played soccer. My life revolved around those activities and trying to secure food. Hope was scarce; I wasn't feeling well. But sometimes, a single message can change everything.

Mine came from a colleague: "There's an opening for gas inspectors," she wrote, and it changed everything. I enrolled in a course that turned out to be the opportunity of a lifetime, and I became the most inquisitive student in the class. My name is Jaider Valencia Balanta, I live in the Pizamos I neighborhood in Cali, and I went from struggling uphill in my previous job and working conditions to doubling my salary.

Arriving at someone's home and telling them whether their gas network is safe or unsafe, whether it needs repair or not, makes me happy. I really enjoy serving customers, because I understand that this job is about saving lives.

Meredith's Hands Weave the Economy of Her Community

“ My name is Meredith López Cabana, and my life is shaped by hand: dolls that hold secrets, cushions that embrace, and bags that carry stories. I pour my heart into everything I create, but sometimes that is not enough to support a household.

“Today, my hands are not only creating crafts. They are weaving my own destiny and the future of my community.”

Three years ago, I returned to my hometown of Puebloviejo, Magdalena. I came back with determination, but without a clear direction. Life felt like a piece of fabric that never quite came together, until a friend told me about Alas Comunidades, an initiative of Fundación Promigas. It was more than a course; it was a comprehensive process. I received technical training to improve my products, business education support to structure my venture, and, above all, financial education tools that transformed the way I manage my finances.

At first, I thought I would simply learn to sew better, but the program went far beyond that. I immersed myself in hours of training, learning how to calculate real costs, set fair prices, keep records, plan my income, and better manage my personal finances. I came to understand that for my venture to grow, I needed to organize my finances, save, reinvest, and plan for the future.

Thanks to the seed capital and the growth and sustainability strategies I learned, my tools stopped being limitations and became drivers of progress.

In Chitagá, Olga Cultivates a Taste for Perseverance

The municipality of Chitagá, in Norte de Santander, is my home. My name is Olga Rendón Mogollón, and I can say that I make my living from the bounty of my land. My life, in a way, unfolds along the "peach route," a path I have followed for 20 years and on which five of us, the driving force behind this project, now depend.

"Technology gave us the strength to transform our land into a productive unit that ensures both food and a future."

I used to rely solely on growing vegetables, but I realized that in order to grow, we needed technology. The Manos al Campo project by Fundación Promigas is making it possible for us to overcome the challenges of living off the land, such as water scarcity. Thanks to this support, we installed large Australian-type tanks with a capacity of 12,800 liters, along with irrigation systems that now power our farm. Water now flows so that peach production never falls short.

What makes me most proud is that this also helps ensure our food security. In the community garden, thanks to technology transfer and training, we grow corn, tomatoes, beans, and cabbage. The land is fertile, and everything thrives here.

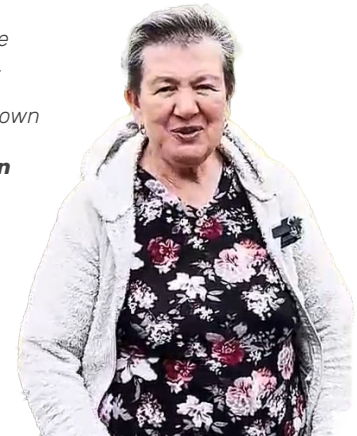

My name is Nieves Fernández, and I coordinate the Sustainable Restoration and Rehabilitation of the Mangrove Ecosystem project under the Territorios Más Sostenibles program, led by Fundación Promigas and Fondo Acción.

“Today, we are not only planting trees. We are also cultivating awareness and sustainability for future generations.”

This project has transformed our territory, as we are not only restoring the mangrove by planting 6,000 trees, but also rebuilding the relationship between the community and its ecosystem. Today, we see greater environmental awareness, increased community participation, and a genuine commitment to protecting our natural resources.

Many families now recognize the mangrove as a source of life, coastal protection, and an opportunity for sustainable development. We gained knowledge in ecological restoration, nursery management, planting, and mangrove monitoring, while also strengthening our organizational capacity and teamwork.

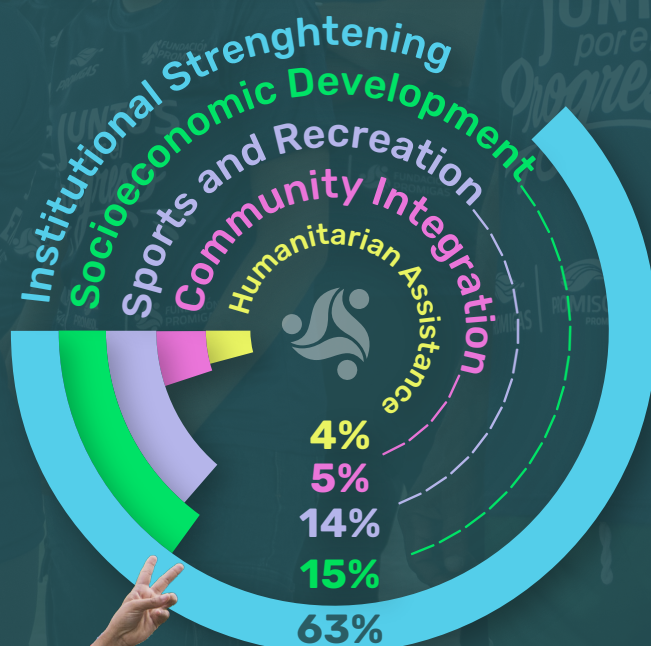

Misión La Guajira

Misión La Guajira represents a meaningful transformation for more than 25,000 people in Manaure and Uribia, who now have access to clean water and energy in their homes through solutions implemented across 81 communities, supported by an investment of COP 17,350 million. The construction of water treatment plants, together with the restoration and drilling of wells, has enabled families to access safe water every day. In parallel, community energy systems and free connectivity have transformed daily life and expanded opportunities.

What once seemed impossible is now a reality that promotes well-being, health, and hope. Strengthening the social fabric through community committees and programs that dignify trades such as handicrafts also helps ensure that these advances are sustainable over time. Creating safe, healthy environments with equitable access to opportunities is essential for communities to thrive.

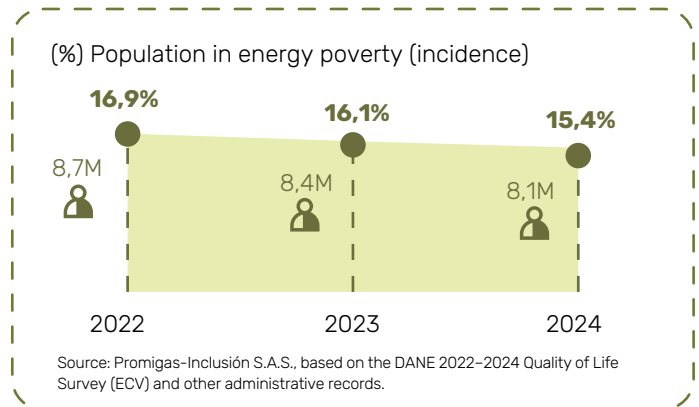

Multidimensional Energy Poverty Index (MEPI): 3 Years of Measurement

The MEPI has become a key tool for understanding and measuring energy poverty in Colombia, as well as for guiding strategies aimed at reducing it. Since 2022, Promigas has demonstrated that gaps in household energy access persist, particularly in rural areas. While the country has made progress in reducing energy poverty, by 2024, 8.1 million people were still in this condition, representing 15.4% of the population.



Key Findings

Over **300 thousand** people overcame energy poverty between 2023 and 2024.

Urban-rural gaps persist: energy poverty is **10 times higher** in rural areas.

The reduction in energy poverty has been achieved primarily through increased access to household appliances, internet, computers, and smartphones.

Challenges in access to and quality of energy persist, particularly in the Caribbean Region and the Orinoquía-Amazonía Region.

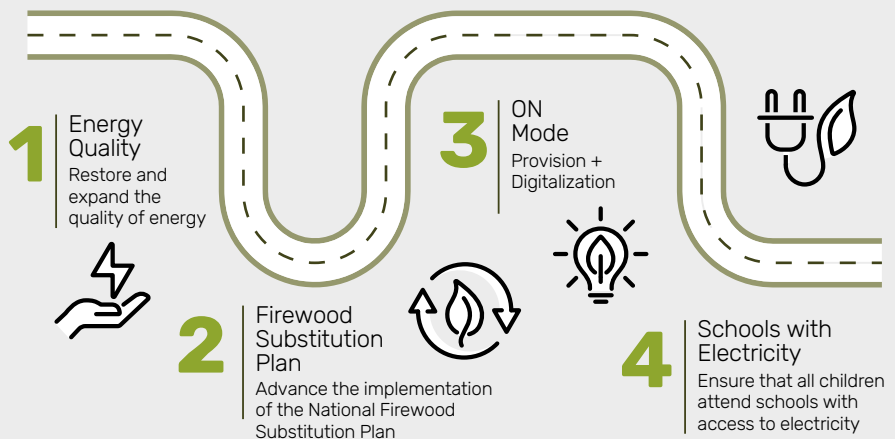


At the pace observed between 2022 and 2024, it would take approximately nine years to reach single-digit energy poverty.

- The real challenge lies in achieving this goal while reducing regional and rural gaps: ensuring that progress is not concentrated in a few areas, but reaches all territories.
- The value of the MEPI lies in ability to transform data into clear directions that guide decision-making and help anticipate risks.

Roadmap to 2030:

Reduce energy poverty to a single digit.

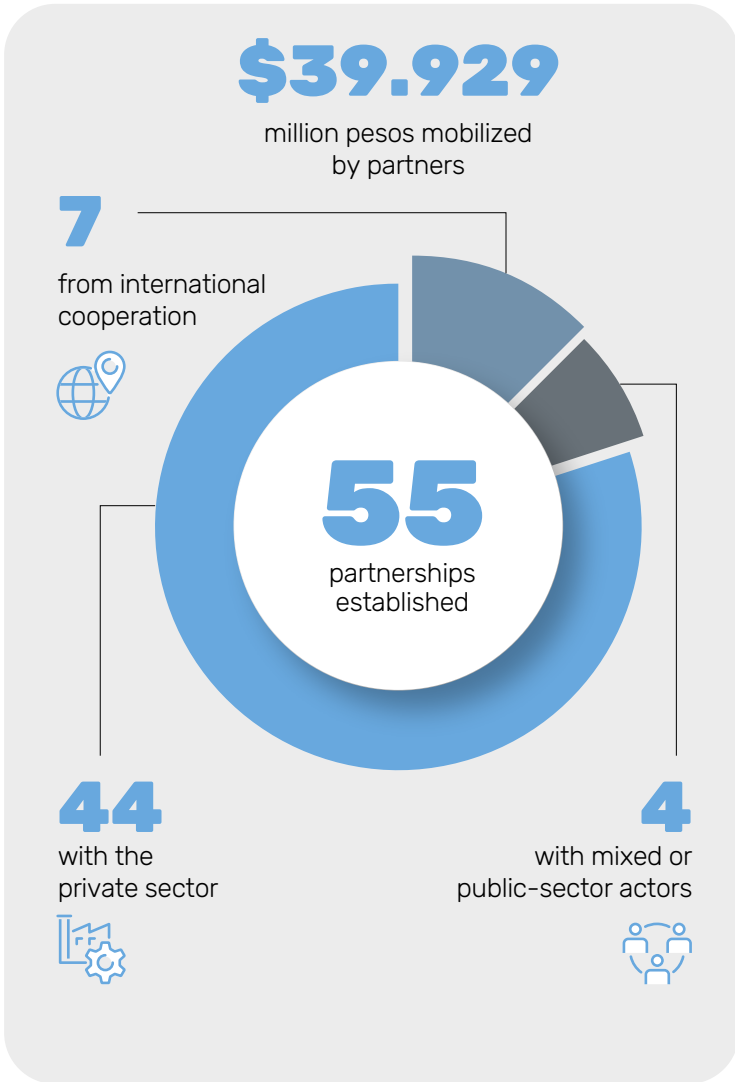
- The primary source of income corresponds to donations received from Promigas and its companies, which increased as a result of inflation, as well as the COP 17,350 million received in 2025 for the Misión La Guajira project, resulting in a significant increase compared to 2024.
- Operating and administrative expenses are mainly associated with the execution of social projects. A significant portion of these will continue into 2026 and will be financed with the surplus generated during the year. The increase compared to 2024 is largely explained by the amortization of COP 8,600 million of the assets derived from the agreement with Fundación Corficolombiana for the Misión La Guajira project.
- The net result of non-operating income and expenses came more than 70% from financial returns generated by temporary investments. Additionally, income was obtained from leases and from the appreciation of properties.
- More than 97% of the surplus for the year committed in agreements signed in 2025 is allocated to the Misión La Guajira project; the remaining balance is available for new allocations in the coming years.
- Finally, it is worth noting that the Foundation faced no restrictions on the free circulation of invoices issued by its suppliers or creditors.

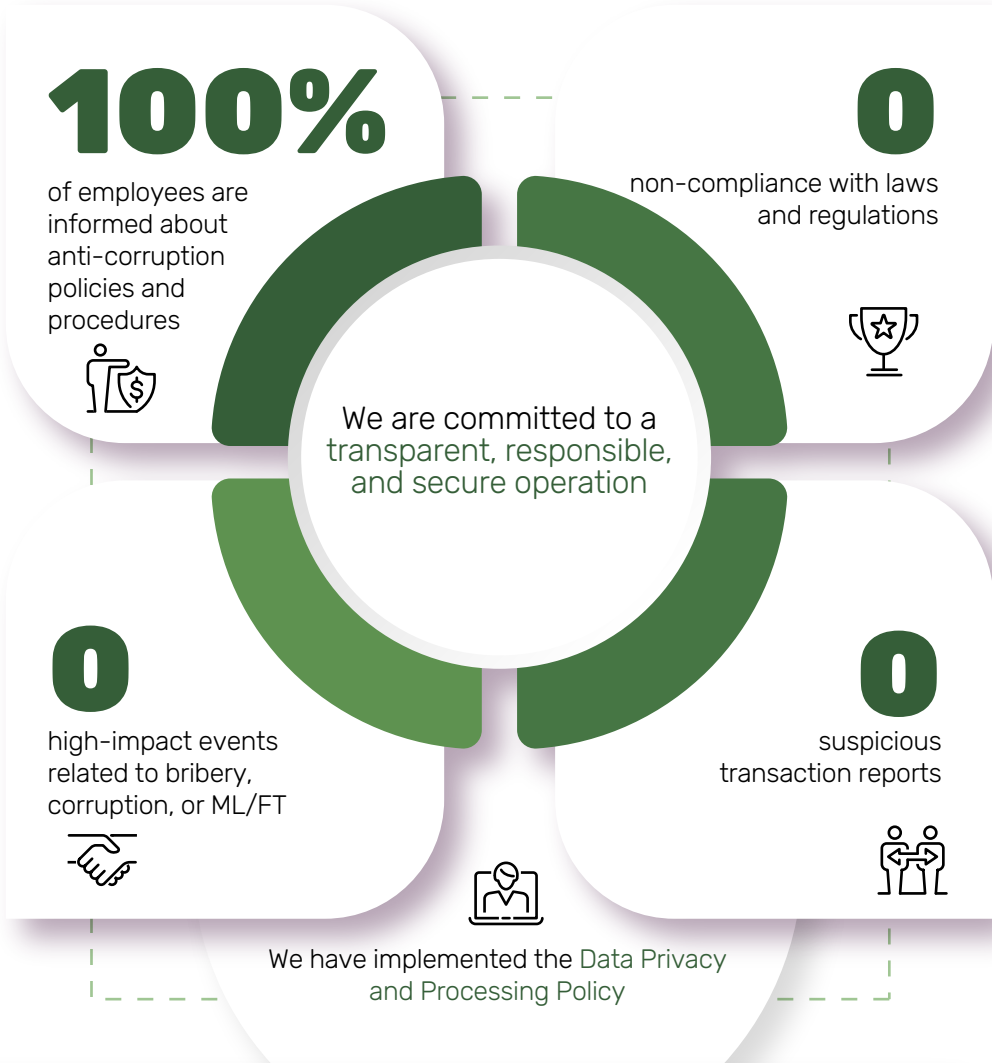

Ethics and Transparency

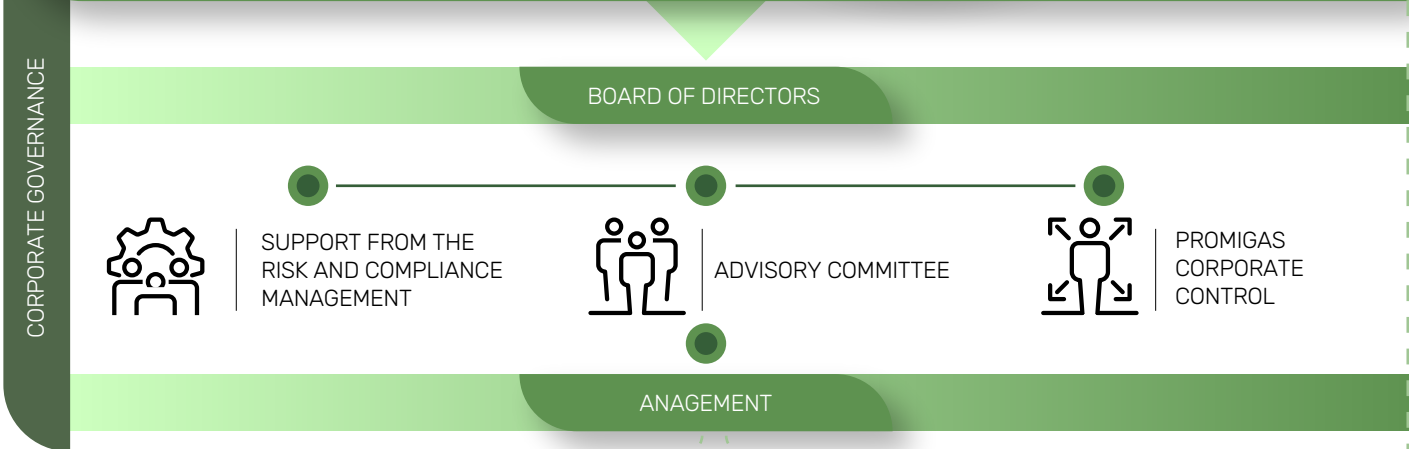
